Hope everyone had a wonderful holiday and have their New Year's Resolutions and "To – Do" list in place. It is exciting to see so many Villagers updating their homes and giving the exteriors a facelift. Last year Phase I & III adopted "Community Standards." The Community Standards are posted on our website, CarrollwoodVillage.com. They are the approved color pallete, roof materials, fencing, driveway pavers etc. for Phases I & III of Carrollwood Village. Going forward it is the goal of each Phase to uniformly enforce the Deed Restrictions. It is important to submit an Architectural Review Form (found on the website) for any exterior work including repainting or re-roofing with the same color or shingle or substantially changing the landscaping.

What might have previously been acceptable may have changed and it is costly to have to repaint, re-shingle or re-landscape. Architectural Review is especially important for new fencing; there are many more options of style and materials, many of which will not comply with the community standards. The Architectural Review Committee has 30 – 45 days to respond to a request so please do not wait until the workers are onsite to get approval. SAYING FAREWELL TO A VILLAGE VISIONARY

John Miley was tough.

Not the kind of tough that one might associate with being a “tough guy” – although he could have been in his youth, I don’t know. No, John reminded me of my high school history teacher who, even after undergraduate and graduate work, still holds the title for being the toughest grader I ever encountered throughout my academic career. John, much like my teacher, was the type of person who never accepted an excuse for anything less than satisfactory, setting a bar of excellence so high it often seemed unattainable. A person of such brutal honesty and a delivery so curt it often left you with a raw and sometimes gut-wrenching critique. The kind of person who did not issue compliments willy-nilly, but rather made you work hard to earn his praise.


Yes, John Miley was tough.

I first met John more than 10 years ago through the Carrollwood Cultural Center. The Center, much like Village Views, Millennium Gardens (now known as the John R. Miley Park in Carrollwood) and the Carrollwood Village Park, was a project that John helped initiate.

John threw himself into these projects – often spearheading the challenge to build something from nothing, or a church, or even a wastewater treatment plant. His groundwork was slow and steady. His careful planning, research, and lobbying mirrored that of a chess player, masterfully strategizing each and every move always thinking through every possible outcome. Even with all of his planning, he expected – and perhaps even welcomed – spirited challengers, often knowing it wasn’t his position that was being challenged, it was him. He knew he wasn’t always the most liked person in the room – often sacrificing his likeability to defend an unpopular opinion or standing firm on what that he believed to be the correct position.

A few years ago, as Village Views was coming to an end, John wanted to ensure the residents of Phase II would still receive updates, especially regarding a new community park that was about to break ground off of West Village Drive. John was one of the people who invited me to join the newsletter team as editor. John was a tough grader, and I knew this, which is why I was truly humbled by John’s endorsement. I accepted and The Villager was born.

Shortly after breaking ground on Carrollwood Village Park, Paul Berg, the executive director for the Carrollwood Cultural Center, told John that he thought the park should be named after him.

“Thanks,” John said, “but that’s not why I do this.”

There was no hidden agenda. No level of notoriety to be sought. John was simply following his sense of duty to serve, build, and grow his community.

It’s impossible to look around Carrollwood Village and not see John’s influence. You see his name posted as a founder or contributor to many of the projects in the Village. However, I can’t help but wonder if his true desire was to serve this community he loved and leave it a better place.

I think the best way to honor John is to be an engaged resident of Carrollwood Village. Participate in all that has been provided. Use it. ENJOY it. Get involved. Take pride. Foster a passion for the Village and fight for the next best thing.

After all, he did.

And, as it turns out, he left it a better place. Please join us to celebrate the life of John Miley, Sunday, January 26, 2 to 4 p.m. at the Carrollwood Cultural Center Main Theatre.



HERE'S A STORY WE BELIEVE THAT YOU WILL ENJOY, FOR ITS HUMOR BUT MOST IMPORTANTLY FOR ITS FOCUS ON OUR CARROLLWOOD VILLAGE NEIGHBORHOOD SECURITY:

A Phase 3 homeowner (let's call him Joe) shared this story that happened on the evening of December 20th. Joe was leaving his home at approx. 1:00 AM to pick up one of his kids from a school dance. As Joe left his street, he noticed a dark colored pick-up truck driving very slowly on West Village Drive. Joe slowed and made a turn in order to keep his eyes on the truck as it was clearly "out of place." The truck turned down Sussex and Joe followed from far behind. Then the truck turned onto Addison, made a U-turn and parked, turning off its lights. Joe passed by and then parked about 100 yards away on Sussex facing the truck to observe. Joe's next move was to dial 911 and tell them what he was witnessing. After providing a description of the truck, the dispatcher informed Joe that officers were in route and asked if he would stay on site, which Joe couldn't do as he needed to go pick up his kid.


As Joe drove past where the truck was now parked with its lights off, the truck started out right behind him following closely. Joe was dialing 911 again when all of a sudden, the truck lit up like a Christmas tree with a full siren going. Turns out- the truck was a very well-disguised undercover Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office truck. As the deputy approached, Joe quickly recognized the deputy and the deputy recognized him as well. Joe had done a 12-hour ride-along with the HCSO last year and spent some time with this deputy. The deputy asked if it was Joe who called 911 on the truck.

They were laughing about the whole situation when two more HCSO cars arrived. One was a marked car, with whose deputy Joe had also spent time on his ride-along. The other was unmarked and driven by a Phase 3 resident! By then, all three deputies and Joe were laughing and reminiscing about his ride-along experience.

Joe asked what they were doing in the Village with undercover cars and they told him they were trying to nab a burglar that had been hitting places on the other side (East) of Dale Mabry and apparently had been spotted using the Village to drive through.

Joe thanked each of them for being very vigilant and they thanked him for being so alert.... As Joe wrote- the point of his story is two-fold, be aware and take action.

As important- you can be sure that HCSO is in our community, even if you don't see them. They are diligently keeping an active eye on all our neighborhoods, and focused on our safety and security. UPDATE ON REZONING FOR THE WETLANDS AT 13856 NORTH DALE MABRY HWY. MM 19-1169

After many delays, the public hearing for the 13856 N Dale Mabry property rezoning is scheduled for Tuesday January 21st. Based on recent documents submitted to Hillsborough County by the developer, we believe the meeting will occur this time. The public hearing will be held at 6 p.m. at the County Center, 601 E. Kennedy Blvd, 2nd floor.


The owner of the MedExpress property at 13856 North Dale Mabry Hwy is proposing to construct two new buildings on the property. Currently the plans call for a "fast casual" restaurant and a new MedExpress building more than twice the size of the current building. The purpose of the public hearing is to change the site's current zoning (from business/professional office to commercial general), which will allow for these high-intensity commercial uses and will allow construction within the wetland area. To accommodate this project, a portion of the adjacent wetlands - one of the few remaining natural, old-growth forest spaces along North Dale Mabry - will be destroyed. This will result in the loss of centuries-old cypress trees and the elimination of precious wildlife habitat in our area. These wetlands also provide much needed drainage to the area. Reducing the size of the wetlands may increase flooding in the nearby neighborhoods and decrease water quality.

In addition to harming the environment, approval of the proposed project will adversely affect the quality of life for residents in the area as a result of: (i) excessive noise, odors and light during the extended hours of operation of high-intensity commercial businesses, (ii) significantly increased traffic along Carrollwood Village Run and Executive Center Drive, (iii) negative health and safety impacts and (iv) reduced property values.

As you may know, several Carrollwood Village residents and our Phase 1 HOA are opposed to the proposed project and have submitted letters to that effect to Hillsborough County Development Services. Opposition to the proposed development can be summarized in two main points:

1. Expansion of the MedExpress and the addition of a new commercial building along Dale Mabry is entirely unnecessary. There is an abundance of available commercial space along Dale Mabry in the close vicinity, that would be better suited for the proposed uses. Therefore, it is grossly wasteful to destroy a centuries-old wetland when the development is not needed. These wetland areas should be protected, not destroyed to build something that is completely unnecessary.



2. Changing the zoning of the property to commercial general is entirely counter to the original intent of the Hayward Place planned development which was originally zoned for low-intensity uses that would not impose on the adjacent neighborhood. The addition of high-intensity commercial businesses will adversely affect the Hayward Place neighborhood and Carrollwood Village as a whole. Further, changing the zoning to commercial general, opens a virtual Pandora's Box of possible bad outcomes.

During the upcoming public hearing, it is critical to have a large turnout of Villagers and neighbors to show support for saving our wetlands and opposing this unnecessary proposal which will adversely affect the quality of life in Carrollwood Village. As stated initially, the public hearing is scheduled for Tuesday January 21st at 6 p.m. at the County Center, 601 E. Kennedy Blvd, 2nd floor. We ask that if you are planning to attend the public hearing, that you please wear a red shirt/top as a sign of solidarity.

WHAT IS PLANNED FOR THE CARROLLWOOD VILLAGE PARK IN 2020?

The County continued to add amenities to the Carrollwood Village Park in 2019. These additions included the Splash Pad, Playground, Amphitheater, Sheriff's Workout Facility and more trees. The park is enjoyed daily by the residents.

They have an ambitious plan for 2020 to make the park an integral part of the community. Here is what is planned for 2020.



2019-2020 dates for construction items:

- Challenge Course - Start mid-January and finish end of March.
- Skate/Pump track - Start mid-December and finish end of March.
- Boardwalk/Fishing Pier - Start early January and finish late May.
- LED and Solar Lighting - Start early March and finish early May.
- Pond Fountains- Start mid-February and finish early March.
- Arboretum- Start "To Be Determined" using tree contract for procurement



HILLSBOROUGH COUNTY HAS BEEN HARD AT WORK IN THE VILLAGE

In December the County replaced and repaired the uneven and broken sidewalks along West Village Dr. between Brushy Creek and the Ben Hill wall. Walkers, especially those pushing strollers, joggers and people roller blading can now enjoy a safer outing. Van Chandler, the property manager met with the contractor for the county regarding the damaged turf and sprinklers the week of January 7. Repairs will be done soon.

The County also finished dredging out the north end of the Pickett pond. This had been in the works for over 2 years since the storm drain pipe collapsed and the pond “silted in”. The Pickett pond has been nominated by the residents along the pond to be accepted into the County’s “Adopt A Pond” program.



GENERATIONS GATHER

“Generations Gather,” a special program of VISTA Gardens, is funded by FOREVER FRIENDS Inc., a not-for-profit organization whose mission is rooted in the value of intergenerational relationships.

One of VISTA’s members, Lori Vella, often gathers “Little Villagers” and their families for activities at VISTA Gardens. These gatherings now include many generations, as middle, high school, or college students guide children and their parents from activity to activity throughout the gardens. They introduce them to VISTA gardeners who offer hands-on gardening activities.

Hunting through a bin of compost, children find a banana peel, the core of an apple, a well-squeezed lemon, the top from a strawberry, and skin of an onion. They learn about which food scraps families may bring to the gardens and how compost adds enrichment to the soil.

Children hear stories about growing food and flowers and taking care of bees and other wildlife, especially the many birds that frequent our gardens.


On a scavenger hunt, children find gardeners harvesting pieces of sugar cane and radishes to share.

They visit many gardens and gardeners as they gather cherry tomatoes, green or yellow beans, flower blossoms, a spring onion, and a sprig of rosemary from VISTA’s container herb garden.

And at every event, children experience working with the soil, planting seeds or transplanting seedlings, and enjoying the harvest.



WHAT TO PLANT AND WHAT TO DO

Bedding Plants: Plants that can be added to the garden during the coolest months include dianthus, pansy, petunia, viola, and snapdragon.

Annuals in Florida: Bulbs: Crinum, agapanthus, and gloriosa lily bulbs can be planted now. Provide a layer of mulch for protection from cold temperatures.

Camellias: Select and plant camellias this month. Visit local nurseries now for the best selection of colors and forms.

Vegetables: Continue planting cool season crops including beet, cabbage, turnip, lettuce, potato, and broccoli.

Deciduous fruit: Now is the time to plant deciduous fruit trees. This will give roots time to develop before the warm and dry spring months.

Cold protection: Frost or freezes are likely this month and next. Be ready to cover tender plants to minimize damage and make sure covers extend all the way to the ground. Old sheets are perfect, weight the edges so the wind does not blow them off.

Irrigation: Lawns and landscape plants are dormant and need minimal irrigation. **Shrubs and Trees:** Prune non-spring flowering shrubs and trees this month to improve form. **Arbor Day:** Florida observes Arbor Day on the 3rd Friday of January. To celebrate, plant a tree in your yard or community.

Crepe Myrtle: While crepe myrtles do not require pruning, removing seed pods, crossing branches and small twiggy growth improves the appearance and form of the plant.

Pests: To control scale on citrus, shrubs, camellias, and deciduous fruit trees, apply horticultural oil while plants are dormant.
