# WHAT IS THE STATUS OF WEST VILLAGE COMMONS AND THE PROPOSED CHARTER SCHOOL?

First of all, many thanks to the 500 plus residents who helped defeat the rezoning of the former Sweetbay supermarket into a K-8 Charter School for 1000+ students. Unfortunately, the battle is not over and your continued support and feedback is needed.

For those of you unfamiliar with this issue, here is some background information. The West Village Commons is the parcel of land bordered by West Village Dr., Ehrlich Rd. and Turner Rd. The southern boundary is Carrollwood Village Phase III. This shopping center and its outparcels actually have three separate owners. The largest parcel is owned by MG3 (a developer of charter schools and nursing homes from Broward county) and it houses the building that formerly was home to a Sweetbay supermarket that is now vacant. Current tenants include the United States Postal Service, Terra Sur, Cepas, Little Caesar's Pizza and several other local businesses. The second parcel houses the Shell gas station and small convenience store. The third parcel is the "wooded area" which remains undeveloped.

MG3, the current owner, attempted to rezone the former Sweetbay portion of the shopping center for a 1000 student Charter school. This was strongly opposed by Carrollwood Village Phase III residents as well as residents in the surrounding neighborhoods along Turner Rd., Ehrlich Rd. and Hutchison Rd. The main issue was incompatibility with the surrounding land use. The rezoning attempt was defeated in the fall of 2017 by the Board of County Commissioners who unanimously voted against the request. MG3 has since filed suit against the County of with the Carrollwood Village Phase III Homeowners Association as a participant. After a year of delays, the case was finally heard in court. The judge has not yet handed down his decision and it is unclear as to when that will happen as well as when the lawsuit will be resolved.

# WHAT IS THE STATUS OF WEST VILLAGE COMMONS AND THE PROPOSED CHARTER SCHOOL? (CONTINUED)

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In the meantime, a highly regarded developer with more compatible neighborhood plans, has approached MG3 to purchase their portion of West Village Commons. If this developer purchases the property, the Charter School rezoning effort will stop. Without the sale, even if we get a favorable ruling, MG3 will continue the legal battle to install a Charter School. Our community needs this sale to happen but there is “hurdle”. In order to attract a “Class A” tenant, and move the sale forward, the third, the “wooded area” detracts from the look and parcel visibility thus would need to be modified. This wooded area at the corner of Ehrlich Rd. and West Village Dr. is also under contract with a different purchaser with unknown plans to develop this part of West Village Commons. Further complicating this is the “wooded area” was designated a wetland area for what we believe was a past mitigation land swap deal. (We are not sure how that factors into the current sales deal).

In response to this, at the January Phase III Board of Directors meeting the Board passed the following resolution unanimously “The Carrollwood Village Phase III Homeowners Association and Community continue to strongly oppose the Charter school for 1000+ students at the West Village Commons location. We are in favor of the concept of developing the wooded lot in accordance to future development with a shopping center that is compatible with our community and quality of life”.

While your board passed this resolution we need your input to support this and future actions. While as with any commercial land, the community has limited say as to the tenants or use as long as it complies with current zoning. But that is where we come in - we do have a voice in rezoning. Fortunately for us, the prospective developers of the third parcel are interested in our feedback. In the next few weeks we will be reaching out to the Phase III residents via a survey for your input. The survey questions will be framed by what we as residents can influence and, for the prospective developers interests, what our community would support. With this goal in mind, this shopping center can finally become a fully functioning upscale shopping center supporting the needs of the surrounding community.


It is apparent to me the atmosphere of renewal is infectious. During my morning walks through the Village, I see examples of this in the many home improvement projects currently underway.

# BIG PLANS FOR THE CARROLLWOOD VILLAGE POND COMMITTEE IN 2019

They say that water is the Life Blood of our planet and the same could be said that it is just as important to our community. Through a collaborative effort of all three phases, the Pond Committee has come together to ensure the continued health and beauty of all our ponds. The committee held their first meeting December 2018 to establish a charter and begin the process of putting their master plan together.

Since then they have met with the County Environmental Scientist and have inspected 4 ponds that are representative of the overall condition of our ponds. The inspections showed the ponds are in good health with some requiring some maintenance to the storm drainage system by the county. There were even reported sightings of a roseate spoonbill.

The focus of the January 2019 meeting was on the Three C's.

- 1) Community Outreach – every Village resident impacts the health of the ponds!
- 2) County Engagement – engineers to help with collapsed storm drains, education of homeowners, Adopt-A-Pond program, Mini-grants for specific projects, source of Florida Friendly Water cleansing plants
- 3) Contractor Management – Village Lawn Care & Solitude Lake Management, LLC



Their first major Community engagement will be a Village wide pond clean-up that is planned in conjunction with Earth Day on April 27th. Many volunteers are needed to make this a success! If your Boy Scout Troop, Girl Scout Troop, School service club, high schooler is in need of volunteer hours, etc. would like to volunteer it would be appreciated.

There is a trash weigh-in contest planned plus pizza lunch. The time and location of kick-off will be announced as we get closer to the event. # WHAT'S NEXT FOR THE CARROLLWOOD VILLAGE PARK?

Carrollwood Park Conservancy (CPC) has been working diligently alongside Hillsborough County Parks & Recreation to make the Carrollwood Village Park a premiere destination. Available amenities currently include walking/jogging trails, outdoor exercise stations, a scenic boardwalk, two dog parks, pavilions, and a great lawn. A slate of exciting new amenities has recently been approved for 2019, which include:

- Nature center
- Pond fountains with lights
- Boardwalk with LED lighting
- Solar trail lighting
- Skate park/pump park
- Shade canopy
- Landscaping/gardens
- A second playground
- Observation pier
- Open air event pavilion as well as a bridge/trellis by the pond



The additional lighting will allow the park to be open later than the traditional “dawn to dusk” hours of other county parks.

## QUESTION FROM A HOMEOWNER:

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Question from a Homeowner who has one of the vine covered boundary walls along their property line... "Who is responsible for the repair of the cracked wall?"

This is a great question that most homeowners living along one of boundary walls needs to know the answer to! The structural integrity of the walls is 100% the responsibility of the homeowner even if the entire footprint of the wall is not on their lot. Only the exterior street facing surface (paint and vines) is the responsibility of the Homeowners Association. The homeowner is not allowed to change the "look" of the wall or change the material used to construct the wall.

Unfortunately, the walls are showing their age and care must be taken to keep them in sound condition. It is important for the homeowner to address any cracks, keep trees trimmed so limbs do not fall and damage the wall, not weaken the foundation of the wall by emptying their excess pool water over the wall or along its foundation. # SPEED AND TRAFFIC CONTROL IN THE VILLAGE

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While the uncontrolled speeding that was occurring in the Village a few years ago has improved, it has not totally been resolved. All of us are responsible for making our Village a safe place to drive, cycle, run and walk! At a recent gathering of homeowners, a couple of people were actually complaining that they were not given a “free pass or warning” since they were Village residents. The officer ticketed them for driving more than 10 mph over the posted speed limit. Sorry, but this is not acceptable, even for Villagers.

So we would like to propose that Villagers “take back” the safety of the Village by making the commitment to drive the speed limit or even a couple of mph slower! If we all made this commitment it might frustrate those who cut thru the Village to save a few minutes off their commute. If they knew they would be stuck behind a car driving the speed limit they would be much more likely to stay on the main traffic arteries. Safety first!

# LOVE OUR VILLAGE ALLIGATORS ENOUGH TO NOT FEED THEM!

Our village like most of Florida has gators. Sadly there are reports of village residents feeding our gators. This is unwise. From the gator's perspective, they are learning that humans are a food source. Eric Hovland, the Associate Curator at the Florida Aquarium, works with the alligators every day and sees firsthand how intelligent these reptiles can be. "And they're going to learn to approach me, but they're not necessarily going to learn that I'm special versus you or the neighbor or someone else." He says that's why feeding an alligator can make it seem aggressive because it loses its natural fear of humans. "You've opened up that avenue for that alligator to explore what he normally would have avoided. It's not even aggressive; it's just that you've re-programmed them in a way."

You may have fed wildlife, like ducks or fish, when strolling through the park or visiting recreational areas. And while it may be tempting to feed a wild alligator, it's also illegal. When you feed alligators, it causes the alligators to lose their natural fear of humans and to associate humans with food. Normally, alligators will avoid humans. But if an alligator has been fed by humans, they will be more likely to move toward humans and could potentially become aggressive.

The lesson here is to love them enough not to feed them. If you want a closer look at a gator, grab the binoculars and keep your distance. Or better yet, head to the aquarium or the zoo.



## HOW TO BE SAFE AROUND ALLIGATORS

1. Don't feed alligators.
2. Keep your distance.
3. Do not attempt to move alligators out of the road.
4. It is illegal to harass or throw things at alligators.
5. Never disturb nests or small alligators.
6. Do not attempt to keep alligators as pets.
7. Keep your pets and children away from alligators.

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To all my wonderful friends, neighbors and so many more whose names I don't know,

First let me say, I was absolutely overwhelmed with the support and the generosity of all my co-workers at Big Cat Rescue, my neighbors in Carrollwood Village and the people who dropped off so many items at the Carrollwood Cultural Center & those of you who dropped food off at my house. Thank you for opening your hearts and pantries for our local federal workers who were in such need of help.

Special thanks go to Big Cat Rescue and the Carrollwood Cultural Center for allowing me to leave boxes in their public spaces which were so quickly filled up and took up quite a bit of room. You helped make such a difference.

Thanks to your support, this past week, my husband & I delivered 518 lbs. of food to Feeding Tampa Bay which was to be distributed to our local federal government workers. The third week in January we dropped off approximately another 400 lbs. of food and just a few nights later my car trunk is stuffed yet again with items that will be delivered tomorrow. By the end of the drive on February 1 the food drive collected and delivered over 1600 lbs. of food in 2 weeks. This was made possible by ALL OF YOU who responded so quickly and with such abundance to the appeal.



The good news is that the government shutdown is over and while for now it's only a temporary reprieve, I feel pretty sure that there won't be a repetition of this miserable state of affairs in the near future.



Even though this part of the drive is ending, there is still an enormous need to support our Tampa Bay food banks even when there isn't a government shut down in progress. In our Carrollwood Village area, the Village Presbyterian Church has put out an urgent call for food donations and of course, there is always the wonderful work that Feeding Tampa Bay does, so I hope you will consider continuing your support.



So once again, from the bottom of my heart, I thank ALL OF YOU for having made this food drive such a successful one. Feeding Tampa Bay was amazed every time my husband and I dropped our load off.

# WHAT TO PLANT IN FEBRUARY



**Lobelia**



**Verbena**



**Strawflower**

**Bedding Plants:** Plants that perform better in the cooler months include petunia, pansy, verbena, dianthus, strawflower, and lobelia. Protect from frosts and freezing temperatures.



**Amazon Lily**



**Crinum**



**Agapanthus**

**Bulbs:** Many bulbs can be planted now. Provide adequate water to establish and protect from cold weather with mulch. Some to try are Amazon Lily, crinum, and agapanthus.

**Azaleas:** With azaleas in full bloom this month, now is a great time to select varieties to add to the landscape.

**Vegetables:** Begin planting warm season crops this month. Bean, pepper, cucumber, tomato, and squash can be started while temperatures are cool.

## Landscape Tips:

**Cold damage to Palms:** If cold weather has damaged palms, proper care may prevent loss of the palm and encourage recovery.

**Prune Roses:** Roses should be pruned this month to reduce and improve the overall form. After pruning, fertilize and apply a fresh layer of mulch. Blooming will begin eight to nine weeks after pruning.

**Shrubs:** Now is the time to fertilize shrubs. Spread fertilizer evenly over the soil surface and water in. Follow with a fresh layer of mulch, which will conserve moisture and reduce weeds.

**Lawn Weeds:** Apply a pre-emergent weed killer (not a weed and feed) to lawns this month to prevent germination of warm season weed seeds. Apply when temperatures rise to 65°F for 4-5 days. Timing is important for good control.
